Arrangements for world road mile record

The World Athletics Council meeting of November 2022 confirmed world record status for the road mile. The window for recognition for records opened on 1 January 2023. A legitimate performance on a certified, unaided course of at least 3:50.00 (men) or 4:19.00 (women) can stand as the inaugural record at any time before 1 September 2023. If those standards are not met by that date, then the best of all ratifiable performances since 1 January will be recognised asworld records. So official records should be in place for the first World Championship race on 30 September.

World Athletics timing technical rules 19.23.3 and 19.24.5 have been amended for the road mile. Normally, road race times are expressed to the nearest longest second. For the road mile, it is specified that tenths and hundredths should be used.

Note that many established international mile races, such as the one held on Fifth Avenue in New York (USA), have traditionally been held on downhill courses which are regarded as aided as they do not meet the conditions required for world road records. As a benchmark, the fastest road miles so far run on suitable, non-aided courses have been:

Women: 4:22.54 Mirriam Cherop (KEN) Honolulu 12 Aug 18

Men: 3:53.3 Edward Cheserek (KEN) Honolulu 12 Jul 19
