# Thousands join Global Conversation

As the Global Conversation nears its conclusion, several key observations have already started to emerge, thanks to the responses from thousands of people all over the world.

Better quality and more facilities, greater coverage of athletics in the media and on television and more athletics in schools appear to be the key drivers of growing athletics across the world.

According to the responses that were submitted up to mid-April, 27% of professional athletes feel that a lack of facilities is the single biggest challenge in growing the sport in their country. 55% of coaches, meanwhile, strongly agree that athletics is the most accessible sport and the best activity to help create a healthier and fitter world.

People identifying primarily as an amateur athlete make up the biggest demographic so far. When asked what would attract more athletics fans to the sport, greater coverage of the sport in the media and on television outside of major championships came out on top. Fans have also expressed a desire to see more coverage in the media with 33% saying the lack of media and television coverage is the biggest challenge to attracting new fans to athletics.

# <u>Timetable released for World Athletics</u> <u>Championships Oregon22</u>

The World Athletics Championships Oregon22 timetable has been designed to allow the world's best athletes to showcase the full range of their skills in the newly reimagined Hayward Field at the University of Oregon.

Athletes wishing to contest any of the traditional doubles – the 100m and 200m, 200m and 400m, 800m and 1500m, 1500m and 5000m, 5000m and 10,000m – will be able to do so, without having to contest more than one discipline on any given day. Other possible doubles include the long jump and triple jump, and the 20km and 35km race walks.

World Athletics and organisers of the World Athletics Indoor Championships Belgrade22 have marked Earth Day 2021 by signing on to the United Nations Climate Change (UNCC) Sports for Climate Action Framework, an initiative supporting and guiding sports organisations to measure, reduce and offset their carbon emissions in line with the Paris Climate Agreement.

The 10-day schedule from 15–24 July 2022 comprises 16 stadium sessions and six road events. Medals will be decided in all evening sessions and a number of morning sessions in the stadium, as well as during all six road events, to enhance the visibility of athletics across all time zones.

The championships will have unprecedented prime time broadcast coverage in the United States under a long-term media rights agreement with NBC Sports.
