Looking ahead to a busy road-running season

The main international series of one-day meets has now drawn to a close for 2021 and the focus has shifted to road racing – specifically the return of Elite Platinum Label marathons and mass participation races.

The first international marathon in the Elite Platinum Label series, the BMW Berlin Marathon, took place at the end of September. It will be followed by major marathons in London (3 October), Chicago (10 October), Boston (11 October), Amsterdam (17 October), New York (7 November) and Valencia (5 December).

The Elite Platinum Label races form the top level of a three-tier road race programme introduced by World Athletics for 2021, prompted by the many calendar changes brought on by the pandemic in 2020. As well as Elite Platinum Label, the programme includes World Athletics Elite Label and World Athletics Label races held across each of the sport's six areas.

Along with top-quality elite fields, all seven of these events will feature races for recreational runners, marking the return of mass participation running after the Covid-19 pandemic put a halt to it for the past 18 months.



World Athletics publishes 2020 Annual Report

World Athletics has published its Annual Report for 2020.

The 2020 consolidated financial accounts should have marked the beginning of a new four-year funding cycle tied, in the main, to the revenues received from the International Olympic Committee (IOC). This was not the case given the postponement of the Tokyo 2020 Olympic Games to 2021 and three of our four World Athletics Series events during 2020.

In what was an extraordinarily difficult year for everyone we made a decision early in the year to concentrate on protecting the revenue we had and, more importantly, focus on reducing our expenditure. This was a good strategy which saw our cash reserves increase by 17% to US\$40m.



Changes to competition rule 32 (events for which world records are recognised)

Decisions related to world records made at the World Athletics Council meeting on 28-29 July in Tokyo:

"Considering the increasing popularity of 50km road races", the 50km was added to the list of events for which world records are recognised. The initial records are to be the best legitimate performances as at 1 January 2022, providing they meet the minimum standards of 2:43:38 for men, 2:59:54 for women in a mixed race and 3:07:20 for a women in a women-only race.

The 35km and 35,000m race walks have also been added to the world record roster, with the initial records being recognised after 1 January 2023. The minimum standards set are to be 2:22:00 (men) and 2:38:00 (women).
