


Looking forward to the World Athletics Awards 2020

This year's World Athletics Awards will be held on 5 December, but with a slight difference. Instead of the usual ceremony in Monaco, the World Athletics Awards 2020 will be an online affair.

This year's ceremony will recognise exceptional achievement in what has been an extraordinary and unprecedented year, both on and off the fields of play, and celebrate the athletes who met the challenges of 2020 head-on to produce some of the finest performances in the history of our sport.

The Athlete of the Year nominees are being announced this week and the winners will be revealed on 5 December. Six other awards – including the President's Award, the Coaching Achievement Award, the Covid Inspiration Award, the Member Federations Award, the Athletes Community Award and the Photograph of the Year – will be presented on the night as the athletics world looks back on an unforgettable year for the sport.

This year's finest athletics achievements will be celebrated at the World Athletics Awards 2020, to be staged as a virtual event on Saturday 5 December and streamed live on the World Athletics YouTube channel.

Eight awards, including those in three new categories, will be presented.
